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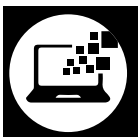

ServSafe Food Protection



SERVSAFE FOOD PROTECTION MANAGER CERTIFICATION

This course will prepare you to be certified or re-certified through the National Restaurant Association ServSafe Foundation. You will cover all major sanitation points, including how food becomes unsafe, proper precautions, personal hygiene, food contamination, regulations and inspection standards. The nationally recognized ServSafe Exam is given as part of this

course. Upon successful completion of the ServSafe Exam, you will receive a copy of your ServSafe Food Protection Manager certificate, which is nationally recognized.

Note: As of January 1, 2018, the Illinois Department of Public Health will no longer require a state FSSMC certificate.

The Personal Success Program (PSP) offers a variety of vocational courses to meet the needs of students 18 years and older with mild to moderate cognitive impairment. The program's focus is on gaining vocational skills to acquire entry-level employment.

Each class is led by a content expert who has experience teaching people with disabilities. A special education teacher is present in most classes to provide additional support. The curriculum is designed to be delivered at a level and pace appropriate to each student's needs.

DEVELOPING STEM COMPETENCIES THROUGH ROBOTICS

This one-day course provides middle and high school educators an introduction to using Tetrix robotics kits for competition. The intended audience is teachers who plan to coach or mentor teams in the Lake County Robotics Competition (LCRC) or who would like to otherwise integrate robotics into their curriculum or club-based activities. This is a hands-on class in which participants will both learn about and assemble structural components, motors, servos, gears, power supplies and more.

Essentials of the Arduino programming interface and use of existing Arduino block coding to control the robots will be reviewed. Participants who complete the course and are interested in entering a team into the next year's LCRC will receive a loaner kit worth \$1,500 for use with their team.

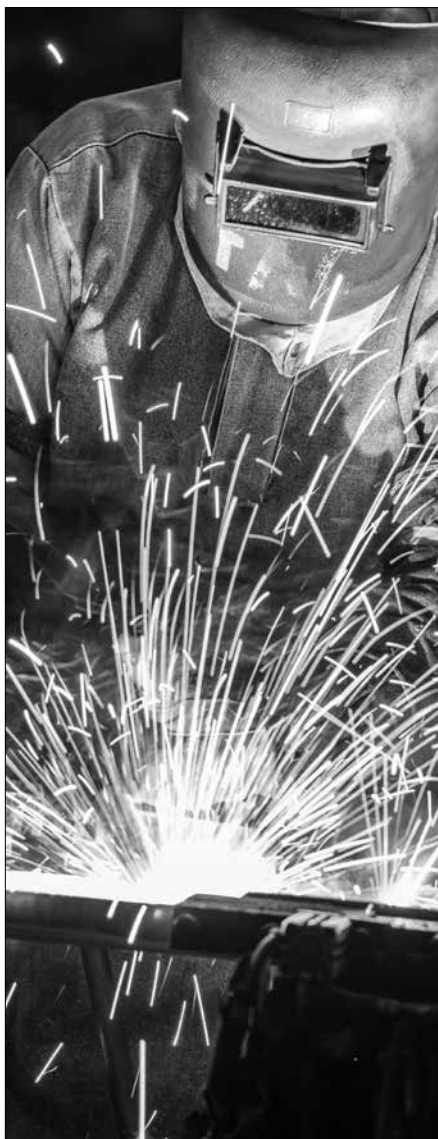

TRUCK DRIVER TRAINING (CDL)

Get on the Road to Your New Career! By earning your Commercial Driver's License (CDL-A), you can train for a variety of high demand opportunities in Lake County.

TRUCK DRIVER TRAINING (CDL)

Students will engage in classroom instruction and behind-the-wheel training in this 160-hour basic training course that meets all state and federal requirements. Students will receive the knowledge and support necessary to pass their CDL permit exam during the first week of class. They will then gain the experience and skills required to prepare for the state-issued Commercial Driver's License (CDL) exams, including the pre-test inspection tests, skills tests and road tests. Students will learn CDL laws, use of controls, safe driving techniques and defensive driving. Students will be taught and mentored by experienced trainers, with a low instructor-to-student ratio to provide individualized training and support. Job placement assistance is also included.

POLICE EVIDENCE TECHNICIAN BASIC

Law enforcement officers will develop CSI skills which will give them the knowledge and practical experience to do every forensic and evidence technician investigation in a professional manner. Topics include photography of crime scene and evidence, diagrams and field sketches, crime scene processing, trace evidence, bloodstain evidence, crime scene management and fingerprint processing. Special emphasis will be given in: burglary, theft, fire and arson investigations, death and sexual assault

investigations, impression evidence, macro photographic techniques, tool and bite marks, firearms and report writing. Students must bring departmental camera, tripod and flash. This course is certified and reimbursable through the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board for Illinois officers. The Evidence Technician class is designed for law enforcement professionals; however, we have opened seats to college students in forensic science studies, high school forensic science teachers and insurance or fire investigators. Veterinary Assistant Training



If you have a nurturing spirit and a desire to help animals, consider a career in the veterinary field! This course trains students to assist veterinarians and veterinary technicians in providing medical care to companion animals. Students training as veterinary assistants will also learn front office procedures as well as how to assist in examinations, hospital procedures, surgical preparation, and laboratory tests, medical terminology, pharmacology, diagnostic imaging and client relations.

This 250-hour NAVTA approved course includes a 100-hour clinical externship experience. Please note that the clinical externship will most likely take place during normal business hours and successful completion of the externship is required to complete the course. Externship dates will

be given in the first month of class to ensure ample time to inform current employers of your training, if needed, as time off from work may be required depending on your schedule. Students must complete a background check at an approved provider in order to participate in the clinical externship portion of the program. Students will also be required to provide proof of current health insurance. Prior felony convictions may prevent participation in the program. The fee for this service is NOT included in the course fee.

Course Prerequisites and Special Notes:

A high school diploma or GED is required. In addition, students must have the following minimum abilities: psychomotor skills (eye-hand coordination and finger dexterity), visual acuity (normal or corrected), and the ability to lift 30 pounds in the clinical setting.

Students may be required to meet specific health requirements and drug testing prior to placement in the clinical portion of the course. This is based on the requirements of the externship site and will be determined at placement. Any fees to meet health requirements are NOT included in the course fee.

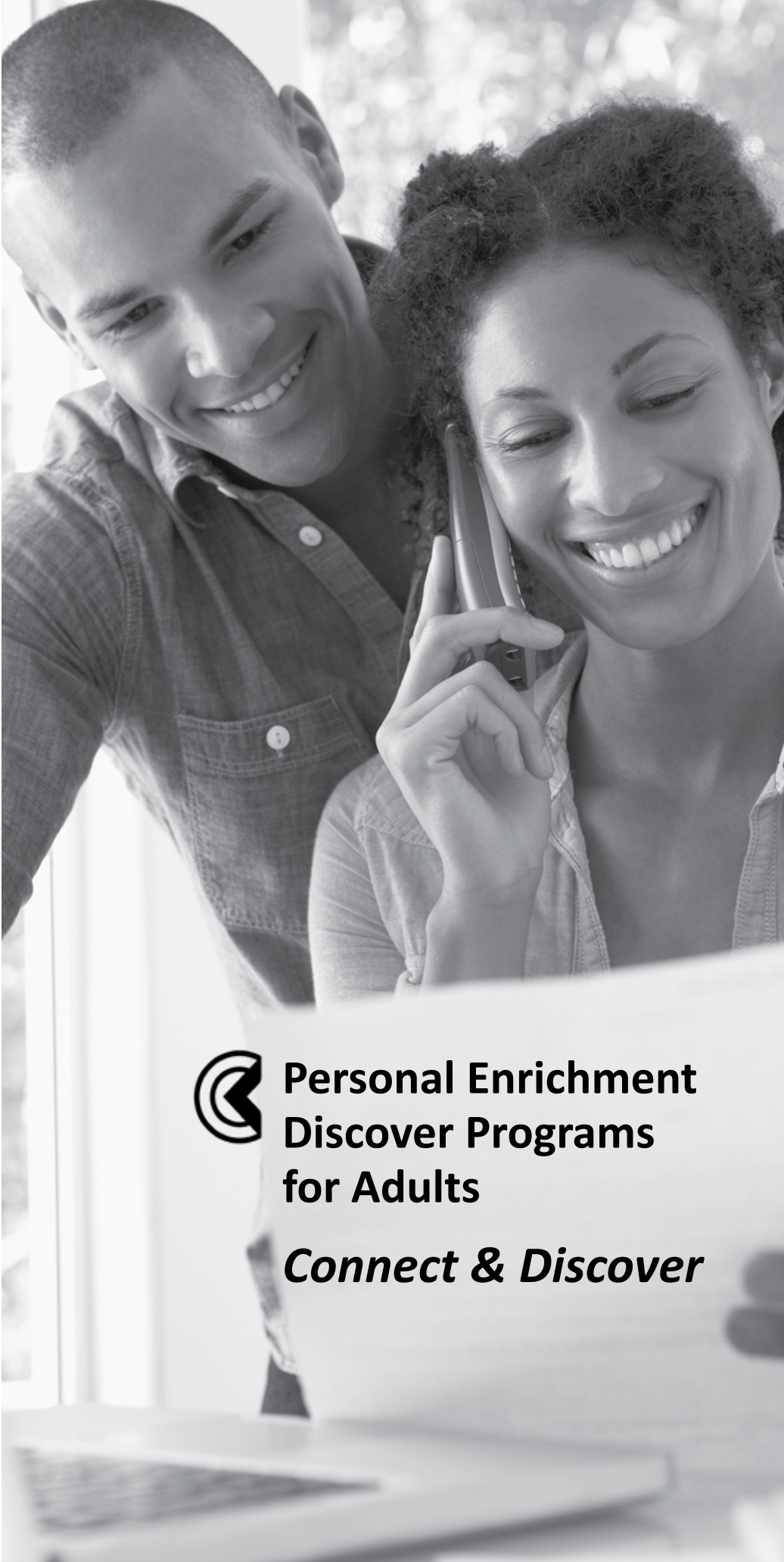

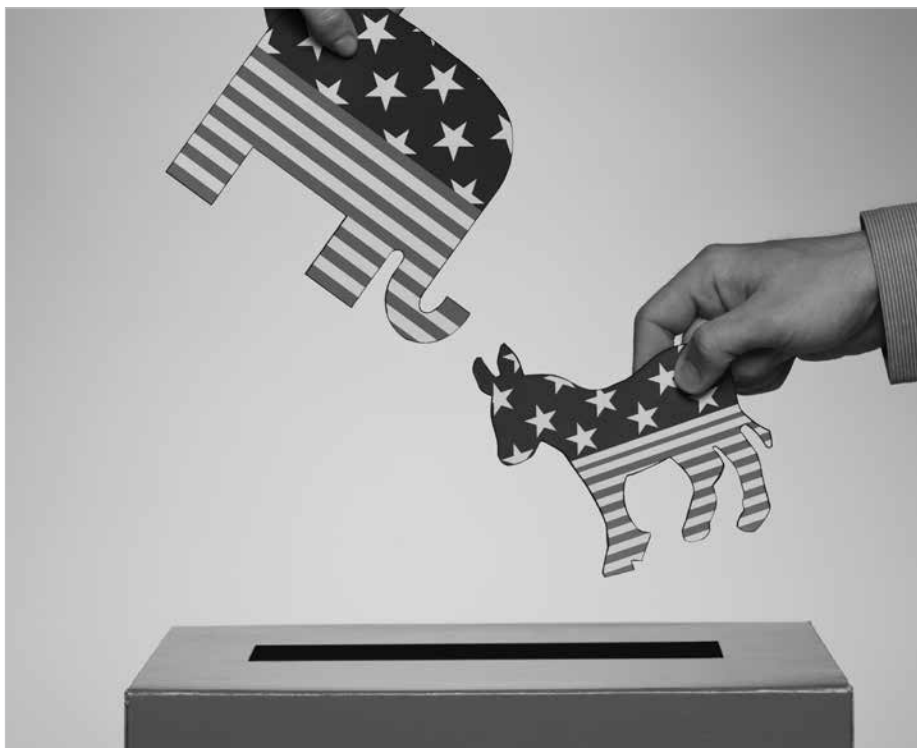

Christine Burke of Lake Barrington enrolled in our Defensive Driving Course. While driving less than a week later, she used a lesson from the course to narrowly avoid getting smashed broadside by a car that ran a red light.

Burke said that she hesitated at the intersection, recalling a tip she learned in the defensive driving course called "delayed acceleration" waiting two or three seconds before entering an intersection if yours is the first car there. She credits this decision with saving her life.
